

The association is now very pleased to announce that after the refurbishment of the hall, members have once again begun to use these brand new facilities. Most of the teething problems concerning Power Points has now been sorted. We urge members to use these facilities with care and to please report any problems to the administration. As the hall rentals are extremely cheap compared to similar facilities, we urge members not be extravagant in the use of electricity, water and other utilities.

The associations HACC Programme was appraised by the department as part of their review. The report suggests that the association was meeting its standards. HELPING CANCER CARERS PINPOINT OWN CARE NEEDS

Carers make an extraordinary contribution to the health and well-being of the Australian community. However, caring can affect their own health and well-being. Carers need to take care of themself, as well as the person they love.

These carers will have many needs - for information and training, for support, or for respite (taking a break). And, these needs can change over time. Being able to identify their needs can help carers to seek relevant information or to reach out to their GP, community nurse or other health professional for support.

A special tool called the Needs Assessment Tool for Carers, or NAT-C, has been developed and tested to help carers supporting someone with cancer pinpoint their own needs. This tool is now available for use by all carers who are supporting someone with cancer.

The NAT-C can be accessed on the CareSearch website. There is also trustworthy material that carers and family members can use to support them in their caring. The CareSearch website and the NAT-C tool are free to use and available when they are needed at www.caresearch.com.au

CareSearch is funded by the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing.

CULTURAL HERITAGE POLICY AND OTHER HERITAGE ACHIEVEMENTS

In February 2011, I released Western Australia's first Cultural Heritage Policy.

A key policy objective was the protection of heritage places. This is being achieved through a number of initiatives.

Previous penalties for illegal works on heritage-listed places in Western Australia offered little deterrence to deliberate unauthorised destruction. Amendments to the Heritage Act increased the penalties from \$5,000 to \$1 million, with the possibility of a ten year moratorium on the development of the land.

To encourage conservation through the provision of practical support for property owners, this year heritage grant funding was increased by 25% to \$1.25 million a year, the first increase since the grants were established in 1996/97.

Property owners affected by the Goldfields earthquake received assistance of \$5 million for repair and conservation works.

This has led to the rejuvenation of the Burt Street precinct in Boulder.

A further grant of \$250,000 to St Mary's Church in South Perth is assisting with preservation of this landmark church.

I introduced regulations to reduce red tape for owners seeking development approval for minor works and maintenance on their heritage properties.

Another key objective of the policy is ensuring that heritage legislation is open, transparent, simple to operate and understand, and reflects best practice.

The current Act reflects 1970s and 80s heritage thinking which takes a very antagonistic and confrontational approach to heritage.

There have been discussion papers and two rounds of public consultation in the development of the policy positions to be encapsulated in a Green Bill.

Work is continuing on a Bill to provide a suitable legislative framework for recognising and protecting our important heritage sites into the future.

I am proud of all that has been achieved in the Heritage portfolio.
